patients in our most rural counties.





Making Strides Against Cancer

The Premier Health Hospital Foundations are dedicated to supporting patients and their families in their fight against cancer. Through donor support, the Foundation continues to pave the way for advancements in cancer treatment and care, offering hope and healing to those battling the disease. From funding cutting-edge equipment and services to providing financial support to patients during their treatments, the Foundations are committed to making a difference in the lives of those impacted by cancer.

In Ohio, lung cancer is the second most common cancer in men and women, and the leading cause of cancer deaths. The rate of new lung cancer cases is significantly higher in Ohio than in the country, with the five-year survival rate significantly lower than the national rate. A generous grant from the Maxon Foundation – U.S. Bank, N.A., Trustees helped Atrium Medical Center Foundation purchase the ILLUMISITE Navigational Bronchoscopy device that allows access to difficult-to-reach peripheral lesions within the lung, enabling physicians to biopsy nodules that might be cancer at a smaller size than with traditional bronchoscopy.

Cancer patients in need of a blood transfusion can spend anywhere from one to four hours in an infusion chair. Miami Valley Hospital Foundation and Good Samaritan Foundation-Dayton continue to raise funds for 25 bays at Miami Valley Hospital North and 22 bays at Miami Valley Hospital South. The outpatient bays contain a specialized reclining chair that offers both heat and massage with the goal of providing a comforting space for our cancer patients during their treatments.

Good Samaritan Foundation-Dayton operates several funds that serve the needs of cancer patients, including a breast cancer fund through the Foundation's Rays of Hope event. Held annually in early November, the event highlights a cancer patient who received support from the fund, which helps breast cancer patients who cannot afford muchneeded medical attention, as well as financial support with the essentials, such as rent, utilities, transportation to treatment, and medication.

In Miami County, Upper Valley Medical Center Foundation partnered with the late Ken Heath and his wife, Jean, to supply Premier Health cancer patients with a Cancer Care Pack. The program offers cancer

patients backpacks filled with necessities, such as a blanket, water bottle, an uplifting book, and journal, to make their infusions and chemotherapy treatments a little more comfortable.



Care in the Air

When every second counts, Premier Health's CareFlight Air and Mobile Services is there to provide emergency transportation for those with serious illness and trauma. The four Premier Health Hospital Foundations recognize the lifesaving value CareFlight brings to our community.

In 2022, the four hospital Foundations purchased 10 Hamilton ventilators that are stationed in each of CareFlight's four helicopters and five Mobile Intensive Care Units (MICUs). These ventilators replaced equipment from 2007 that are no longer in production.



"Ventilators are a standard piece of equipment required for the transport of critical patients," says Beth Calcidise, former director of CareFlight Air & Mobile. "The State of Ohio requires ventilators

for licensure and our accreditation body additionally requires they are readily available on all vehicles providing transportation of critically ill or injured patients."

The new Hamilton ventilators have an integrated oxygen consumption calculation and project the

amount of time a patient can be supported on the current settings, a safety aspect necessary for care. The ventilators also allow for additional modes of ventilation and an increased Positive End-Expiratory Pressure support for COVID-19 and other high risk respiratory cases that CareFlight frequently transports.

Less than a week following the delivery of the new Hamilton ventilators, CareFlight received a request from a Southeast Ohio hospital needing to transport a 6-week-old child diagnosed with RSV to Pittsburgh.

"No pediatric beds were available within 200 miles due to hospitals being at capacity, so they had to admit the baby into their adult ICU," explains Calcidise. "The baby was critically ill and likely would not survive unless they were able to be transferred."

Multiple nearby air ambulance services were called to transport the infant, but none could accommodate the baby's needs. The hospital eventually called CareFlight to see if the ventilators on board the helicopter could support the child.

"Our CareFlight team arrived at the child's bedside and immediately transitioned the infant to our Hamilton vent," says Andrew Hawk, MD, former



medical director of CareFlight. "The physician wanted to recheck the baby's blood gas after being on our ventilator and she had drastically improved."

Due to the Foundation's support and

the lifesaving Hamilton ventilator, the highly skilled CareFlight team was able to deliver the specialized care the baby needed. The flight was about 60 minutes to Pittsburgh, and the baby had significantly improved upon CareFlight's arrival to University of Pittsburgh Medical Center.




CELEBRATING 40 YEARS OF EXCELLENCE



A symbol of hope and strength for the community, CareFlight consists of four helicopters, five ground MICUs, and a team of more than 200 people dedicated to the health and safety of those who need immediate medical care and swift transport.

Since 1983, CareFlight has transported more than 78,000 patients and served more than 200 hospitals surrounding Ohio. Throughout its history, CareFlight has offered its services to more than 700 fire and police departments in a 150-mile radius of Southwest Ohio.

The Foundations are proud to support this critical service that has saved thousands of lives in our community.

Transforming Cardiac Care

Enhancing the quality of care for our cardiac patients is vital to the mission of Atrium Medical Center Foundation. Through the Foundation's Kindness Campaign, the cardiac cath lab's three rooms are being renovated thanks to the generosity of our donors.

"As a full-service hospital in Middletown, this project



is being highlighted by new technology and additional space to handle the growing demand for cardiac services," says Mouhamad Abdallah, MD, medical director of Atrium's Chest Pain Center and

Cardiac Catheterization Lab. "Cardiac catheterization services are vital as the patient population ages and as comorbidities like diabetes, hypertension, and obesity increase."

Gifts to the Foundation supported the installation of new imaging systems, providing cardiologists with improved views of coronary arteries. This cutting-edge equipment ensures better diagnostic accuracy and enables prompt detection of cardiac issues. The enhanced imaging quality replaces outdated equipment that was no longer sustainable due to the lack of available parts.

"Cardiovascular disease is one of the top three causes of death in Butler and Warren counties," explains Dr. Abdallah. "These enhancements, funded by the Foundation, also added lab space to accommodate the needs of this community."

Beyond the advancements in technology, the renovations address operational efficiency and patient convenience. By minimizing downtime and reducing equipment breakdowns, the waiting period for procedures will be significantly shortened.

"We wouldn't be able to do this without the community's help," says Lisa Baker, RN, manager of Atrium's Cardiac Cath Lab and Pain Center. "This is a very costly project, and we are so appreciative of the Foundation and their donors for recognizing a need

and supporting this much-needed renovation for our patients."

The Foundation has been actively contributing to each of the four phases of this project. The support of our donor community has played a vital role in maintaining and investing in cardiac care.

"Donors are doing a huge favor for Middletown, Atrium, and for our patients by advocating for our mission, and we are truly appreciative of their support," says Dr. Abdallah. "Simply put, their support of the cardiac cath lab is saving lives."

Renovations of Atrium's cardiac cath lab represent a significant milestone in advancing cardiac care in Southwest Ohio.

The Barnes also started the Foundation's Heritage Society, which recognizes those who include the Foundation in their wills or estate plans.

The gala included a silent auction with more than 75 prize baskets and experiences available for gala participants, as well as an inaugural President's Choice Bourbon Raffle, where one person received five highly coveted bourbons and was invited to a bourbon tasting for two with Dr. Bricking and his wife, Cindy.







Emergency Care for Seniors

" \mathbb{I} t is so reassuring for our senior population to know that we have a special space in our emergency department. *These specialized rooms* provide comfort and peace to seniors in a time that can be scary and disorienting."

Specialized care is critical for older patients in need of emergency treatment. Through the generosity of donors, Good Samaritan Foundation-Dayton helped establish a Senior Emergency Program at Miami Valley Hospital North.



"We have seen an increase in the number of patients in the Emergency Department," explains Alison Potts, MSN, RN, NE-BC, director of nursing at the North Campus. "Patients over the age of 65 account for about 30 percent of the

visits to the emergency department and about 60 percent of the total hospital admissions."

Significant gifts from the estate of Don and Margaret Penny and The Maxon Foundation, U.S. Bank, N.A., Trustee provided funding for the emergency department to be reconfigured for three seniorfriendly rooms to eligible patients ages 65 and older. "Donor assistance from the Foundation has been critical in supporting our Senior Emergency Program by providing services and tools for our older patients and their families who come to us for treatment," says Peggy Hale, DO, a board-certified emergency medicine physician.



Currently, the North Campus is the second-busiest ED in the Premier Health system, only behind Miami Valley Hospital's main campus. In 2022, nearly 44,700 patients were served by the ED at the North Campus. The specialized treatment areas for seniors are designated rooms with amenities and equipment that create a safe and more comfortable experience for senior citizen patients and their families.

"It is so reassuring for our senior population to know that we have a special space in our emergency department," says Dr. Hale. "These specialized rooms provide comfort and peace to seniors in a time that can be scary and disorienting."

The three treatment rooms offer a different level of privacy and comfort, with solid doors, nonskid floors,

calm color accent walls, specialized lighting, largefaced clocks, easy access to warm blankets, bedside commodes, mobility aids, and space to accommodate family members and support aids.

Premier Health was the first health system in Ohio and the second in the nation to achieve system-wide Geriatric Emergency Department Accreditation from the American College of Emergency Physicians. This distinction recognizes emergency departments that provide excellent care for older adults.

"Clinical staff are specially trained in caring for seniors, including specific education in geriatric emergency care and health care screening protocols," explains Potts.

These services to our elderly population would not be possible without the support of Foundation donors.

"We are incredibly grateful to Good Samaritan Foundation-Dayton for their support of this program," says Potts. "Their donors have been instrumental in helping us serve the needs of this special population."



Offering in-Home Care

Good Samaritan Foundation-Dayton has been instrumental in supporting the Community Paramedicine Program, a collaboration between Premier Health and the City of Dayton Fire Department to provide in-home care to patients with limited access to health care services.

Since winter 2019, the program has served more than 315 eligible residents by providing free access to primary care physicians, prenatal care, senior care services, medications, and basic needs such as food and safety.

"This collaboration between Premier Health and the City of Dayton Fire Department is aimed at positively



affecting the health and wellness of patients and help reduce readmissions," says Brendan

Deere, EMT-P/I, manager of Premier Health's EMS Center of Excellence. "Our patients have

benefited tremendously from the support and resources they receive from our paramedicine program outside the hospital setting."

The program's team of a City of Dayton Fire Department emergency medical technician (EMT), paramedic, and social worker visits enrolled patients in their homes to offer health assessments, safety checks, COVID-19 vaccinations, and education about health condition management and medical care resources.

Kendra Harris, a paramedic for the City of Dayton Fire Department, explains the team supports patients who may not understand how to navigate available resources.



"Our goal is to educate our paramedicine patients about their diagnosis in the comforts of their own home."

The program, which is funded by gifts from Good Samaritan Foundation-Dayton donors, provides patients with time and attention, addressing chronic conditions and connecting patients to appropriate resources to improve their health and hopefully reduce future hospitalizations and health emergencies.



Serving Underserved



Social determinants of health continue to be a focus for the Foundations. In partnership with CareSource, the Miami Valley Hospital Foundation helped fund a new Premier Community Health Mobile Clinic that will serve people in communities with limited access to health care throughout Southwest Ohio.

"The new Mobile Clinic will enhance our current program by providing private exam rooms, fully functioning testing equipment, and handicap accessibility," explains Paula Thompson, former president and CEO of Fidelity Health Care. "This new coach allows us to expand the number of events,





provide additional screenings, and offer more resources to people in our underserved communities with compassionate and respectful care."

The new 2022 Ford E450 Mobile Clinic provides

patients with two private exam rooms, ADA accessibility, and WiFi. The program currently offers health screenings, such as blood pressure, total cholesterol, HDL cholesterol, blood glucose, and hemoglobin A1c; health and lifestyle education; and flu and COVID-19 vaccinations.

Patients ages 18 and older who utilize the Mobile Clinic receive free care through funding from the Premier Health Community Benefits Program and the health system's four hospital Foundations.

The Mobile Clinic program, which launched in 2019, has served thousands of patients who are uninsured or underinsured. In 2022, the Mobile Clinic provided nearly 1,000 screenings at community events and weekly screening stops.

Since its inception, the Mobile Clinic has been instrumental in the health system's Barbershop Health initiative; COVID-19 testing and vaccination clinics; serving patients during the 2019 Memorial Day tornadoes; and participating in community events,

such as drive-thru food distributions at the Foodbank. Additionally, the Mobile Clinic partners with CareSource to provide patients and community members with education on free or low-cost health insurance services.

"The Mobile Clinic program bridges the gap in access to health care, especially between health care professionals and community members who may not have access to care or a physician,"

says Thompson. "This new coach will significantly increase community outreach to high-risk populations as we expand our overall program footprint."

The new Mobile Clinic replaces a 2004 Airstream Bus that was funded by The Maxon Foundation, U.S. Bank, N.A., Trustee and Atrium Medical Center Foundation.

Debi Zimmerman loves spending time with her grandchildren and dogs. The active 69-year-old Washington Township resident never dreamed she would find herself in the back of an ambulance after suffering a heart attack.

"I wasn't sure what was happening," remembers Debi. "The following morning, my doctor put two stents in to open up blood flow."

Debi suffered a heart attack in 2012 when she was 59 years old. Now, more than a decade later, she continues to work hard to never experience another health scare as she did that day.

"I have COPD and emphysema really bad," says Debi. "I have to continue to keep all of this in check in order to stay healthy and active."

For nearly four years, Debi has been a patient of Miami Valley Hospital's pulmonary rehabilitation program. Recently, the rehab program was moved to Miami Valley Hospital South to become the Dr. Mukul S. Chandra Cardiovascular and Pulmonary Disease Prevention and Rehabilitation Center.

Foundation, this new facility honors the legacy left behind by beloved cardiologist Mukul S. Chandra, MD. The new center offers a larger workout area, additional exercise equipment, new technology,

updated locker rooms, convenient handicap accessibility, and space for future growth and innovation.

"This center provides multiple programs to our patients," explains Sophia Dillhoff, BSN, RN, nurse manager of the center. "It's a cardiac rehab, a pulmonary rehab, and then we also have our HeartWorks program, which includes vascular rehab and preventative cardiology."



Debi says the facility at Miami Valley Hospital South has made a difference in her rehab, treatment, and overall experience.

"It's brighter," says Debi. "I love all

the windows. You can see the flowers; you can see the trees. It has so much more equipment and allows all the patients to participate."

Leaders with the new Dr. Chandra center say this enhanced facility would not have been possible without the support of Foundation donors.



Advanced Technology:

Mary K. Rike loves to bake and spend time in the kitchen. But her time doing the activities she loves was hindered by the pains associated with her kidney stones.

"I had four babies naturally, and the pain is pretty much like that," explains Mary. "It is very painful."

Mary had been treated both medically and surgically the past couple of years by Robert Kohut, MD, at Premier Health Urology at Upper Valley Medical Center.



"The blocked flow of urine causes immense pain in the kidney," says Dr. Kohut. "Other signs could include blood in urine, burning with urination, nausea, and vomiting."

After Mary's third experience with kidney stones, she underwent a laser lithotripsy, an advanced procedure

that uses a laser to break kidney stones into tiny pieces.

"This is a surgical procedure where a small camera goes into the ureter and/or kidney," says Dr. Kohut. "When the stone(s) are visualized, they are fragmented with a laser."

In 2022, the Foundation purchased a new Lumenis Pulse Laser System with MOSES Technology, an innovative device that has significantly improved the management of stones in advanced urology procedures, including a 20 percent reduction in procedure time and a 33 percent improvement in fragmentation efficiency.

"The device purchased by the Foundation replaces outdated equipment," says Dr. Kohut. "This is a needed upgrade that can treat larger stones more efficiently and can also decrease the number of procedures a patient may need to rid themselves of a stone."

After being placed on medication to prevent kidney stones, Mary is back to doing the things she loves and is grateful to the Foundation and Dr. Kohut for helping guide her through the pain and procedure.

"Everyone - the nurses, anesthetists, the doctor - are very informative to me and to my family waiting to hear about a procedure," says Mary. "I was a little nervous. They calmed me down, got me through it."

Dr. Kohut says this advanced, new equipment would not be available to the community without the support of UVMC Foundation.

"The Foundation donors have been instrumental," explains Dr. Kohut. "They have allowed me to bring care that is typically not available in rural areas. This support and service is extremely beneficial to our patients and to those in our community."

This device, purchased by the Foundation, will advance treatment and care to UVMC kidney stone patients.

Eree Community Health Screenings



In keeping with our mission to enhance health and wellness in our communities, Upper Valley Medical Center Foundation has partnered with Miami County Foundation, the Troy Foundation, and Piqua Community Foundation to host free monthly health screenings across Miami County.

The free screenings include blood pressure and glucose checks provided by Premier Community Health nurses.

Regular health screenings are critical in helping prevent and detect chronic health conditions, including heart disease and diabetes. According to Miami County Public Health, heart disease and diabetes are more prevalent in Miami

> County than any other county n Ohio.

"We are pleased to be able to bring these free screenings back to our community," says Duanna Osting, president of the UVMC Foundation. "These simple health checks to monitor blood pressure and glucose levels can help identify conditions that, if left untreated, can contribute to increased risk of heart attack, stroke, diabetes, and other health problems."

"We're grateful to our hospital foundation and the community foundations that are helping to fund this program as part of Premier Health's mission to support strong, healthy communities," explains Kevin Harlan, UVMC president.

Since relaunching the program following the COVID-19 pandemic, more than 100 people participated in the monthly health screenings. Health insurance is not required thanks to donor

> support from UVMC Foundation and its partners.

"Offering these at convenient locations in the community allows health care professionals to

engage with the community at a time and place that is easily accessible," says Sumayyah Shermadou, MPH, CHES, program manager at Premier Community Health.

"High blood pressure is known as a silent killer," explained Shermadou. "Oftentimes, those who have high blood pressure don't realize they have it because they don't experience or show any symptoms. This program aims to detect and address these health risks early on, helping people to take control of their health and prevent potentially life-threatening complications."
